## Preface to Section 18 of the translator: Prophecy about the animals

This has been automatically translated using Google Translate. This can cause unintentional errors.

Although Enoch here says it was a dream, this is a long and detailed prophecy. The Guardians may have told him this by saying it was a dream. He wrote it in his own words, his style is easily recognizable, especially where the story gets complicated.

Most of the prophecy's content is now history and recognizable as biblical stories, but the ending stretches into the future. There are no names or dates, but the different animals represent the different countries or nationalities (added in brackets for clarification). In the next section (19), the ten weeks relate to the same story, but from a different point of view.

We start in 85.3 with Adam and Eve, Cain and Abel. Cain and his descendants are found in 85.5

Seth was born to Eve in 85.8. Next (85.9-10), Enoch's family line is described as in Genesis chapter 5.

The star of 86.1 is the first of the Guardians to appear. They are represented in this story by stars rather than animals - an indication that they are the real authors, or at least the editors of this section. The first is the fall of Satan, perhaps a senior member of the Watchers. It seems

point out that we don't have any reliable information about this story, the information here is that Satan is the cause of people's dissatisfaction.

(Editor's note: Why shouldn't that be reliable information? After all, it's the same in the other books of the Bible.)

The period where the book of Enoch begins in 86.3 and continues until 88.3. Here the runaway angels are described as fallen stars. This is also described at the beginning of chapter 6 in Genesis - Sons of God (Godlings in Hebrew) desired the daughters of men. This connection led to the giants (Nephilim - means "fallen", as "swept away").

In 87.2-3 Enoch describes what the creatures from heaven are like, and actually he says that they looked like white men, and they raised him up to their tower. 88.1-3 seems to describe serious warfare using advanced weaponry.

The story of Noah (possibly 17,000 BC) begins at 89.1 and continues until 89.9.

The flood starts at 89.2. Noah's three sons, Shem, Ham and Japheth, the fathers of all animals (lands) in 89.10. The white bull at the end of 89.10 is Abraham (possibly 2166-1991 BC).

## This week.

In 89.11, Abraham's son Ishmael (2080 BC) is a wild donkey, and Isaac (2066 BC) the white bull.

Isaac has sons, one a wild boar, Esau, and the other a white sheep, that is Jacob (2006 BC) At the end of 89.12 Jacob has twelve sons, the patriarchs of the 12 tribes.

In 89.13 Joseph is sold to the Ishmaelites or Midianites (donkeys) and then (1898 BC) to the Egyptians (wolves), see also Genesis 37.25 and 39.1.

Genesis 42 is described from 89.14, the time in Egypt. In 89.15 we get the events of the book of Exodus.

There is a long section describing the life of Moses (1526-1406 BCE), from 89.16-38, which is probably why Moses believed that Enoch walked with God (as mentioned in Genesis 5:22). 89.18 introduces Aaron. And the splitting of the Red Sea is described with the texts in 89.24-25.

Crossing the Jordan River (1406 BC), 89.39, in chapter 3 of the book of Joshua. In this verse, the Judges are also briefly mentioned.

The ram of 89.41 is probably Samuel, followed by Saul, 89.42, (chapter 22 of 1Samuel in the Bible), and these are followed by David (1010 to 970 BC) in 89.45.

The dogs are the Philistines.

The time of Solomon (970-930 BC) is in 89.48 and the construction of the Temple in 89.50 (the tower). The period after Solomon begins with 89.51 and the death of a prophet. The one saved, 89.52, is Elijah.

In 89.56, the phrase "he leaves the house" probably refers to the time of King Manasseh when the Levites took the Ark of the Covenant and left Israel (around 670 BCE). They also took the book of Enoch with them, and eventually settled located in Ethiopia. The lions in this part are the

Assyrians. There is a change of scenery in 89.59, which probably coincides with the religious reforms under Josiah (620 BC), see chapter 34 of 2 Chronicles. There are 70 shepherds, these are the various religious leaders in Jerusalem since that time.

In 89.66 there is the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem by the Babylonians (587 BC) The remnant after the exile (538 BC) can be found in 89.72. The three returning are Ezra, Haggai, and Zechariah, all of whom have books in the Bible.

The second temple period is in 89.73 and this is described in Malachi (450-400 BC) his book is the last book of the Old Testament.

The eagles first appear in the story at 90.2, which are the Romans. Fifty-eight of the shepherds served in their day at verse 90.5. The little lambs with the open eyes (90.6) could be the Essenes.

At 90.8 is the death of John the Baptist - by the ravens.

Yeshua is the "sheep with the great horn" in 90.9-16. Interestingly enough, it doesn't specifically say that he was killed, just that his ministry was stopped by a conspiracy. In 90.17 the last twelve shepherds have their own book. This must be the Christian era. The prophecy then moves to the future. In 90.18, God strikes the earth in anger. This is the "second ending" in the next section. There are no recognizable events after this one, the story goes far into the future and only time will reveal its meaning.

## Section 18: PROPHECY ABOUT THE ANIMALS

- 85.1 And after that I saw another dream, and I will leave it all to you see my son.
- 85.2 Then Enoch lifted up his voice and said to Methuselah his son: "To thee speak I, my son. Hear my words, and incline thine ear to it dream vision of your father.
- 85.3 Before I took your mother Edna I saw a vision on my bed: And a bull (Adam) came forth from the earth, and that bull was white. And after that a heifer (Eve) came out, and out of the heifer came two bulls forth, and one of them was black (Cain) and the other red (Abel).
- 85.4 And the black bull (Cain) struck the red bull (Abel) and chased it over the earth, and from then on I could no longer see the red bull (Abel).
- 85.5 But that black bull (Cain) grew, and a heifer (his wife) went and I saw that many bulls (the descendants of Cain) came forth from those who were like him, and who followed after him.
- 85.6 And that cow (Eve) who was the first went out from the presence of that first bull (Adam), looking for the red bull (Abel), but could not find him find. And she complained bitterly and kept searching.
- 85.7 And I looked at that first bull (Adam), came to her and calmed down her, and she didn't scream from that time on.
- 85.8 And after this she gave birth to another white bull (Seth), and after that she gave birth to a large number of black bulls and cows (many others children).
- 85.9 And I saw in my sleep that the white bull (Seth), how it grew and a became a great white bull. And out of him came many white bulls, and they were if he.
- 85.10 And they became fathers to many white bulls (children) who like them were, one father after another.
- 86.1 And again, I looked with my eyes while I was sleeping, and I saw heaven above, and a star (Azazel) came down from heaven, and it rose up and ate and pastured among those bulls.
- 86.2 And after this I saw the great bulls and the black bulls, and they all changed their rumen (stomach), and their pastures, and their calves. And they started to murmur, one after the other.
- 86.3 And again I saw in the vision and looked up to heaven, and I saw many stars (the Watchers), how they came down, and out of the heaven were thrown because of that first star, and they fell under those heifers and bulls (male and female). They were with them, and graze among them.
- 86.4 And I looked at them and saw that they all had private parts like horses, and began to take the cows (women) from the bulls to use. And they conceived and gave birth to elephants, camels and donkeys (great giants, Nephilim and Elioud).
- 86.5 And all the bulls were afraid of them, they were terrified of them. And they began to bite them with their teeth, and devour them, and stabbing with their horns.
- 86.6 And so they began to devour those bulls, and all the sons of the earth began to tremble and shake before them and fled.
- 87.1 And again I saw them, how they began to stab each other and devour, and the earth began to cry.
- 87.2 And I lifted up my eyes to heaven again, and saw in the vision that from heaven came beings who were like white men (angels) and four came out of that place (the archangels), and three others with them.

- 87.3 And those three who came last took me by my hand and took me from the generations of the earth, and lifted me up on a high place, and showed me a tower high above the earth, and all the hills were lower.
- 87.4 And one said to me, "Stay here until you have seen all that befalls these elephants and camels, asses (great giants, Nephilim and Elioud), and the stars (the Watchers), and all the bulls (the men)."
- 88.1 And I saw one of the four (Raphael), who had appeared first, how he seized that first star (Azazel), which had fallen from heaven, and bound it on his hands and feet, and threw it into an abyss. And that abyss was narrow and deep, terrible, and dark.
- 88.2 And one of them drew his sword, and gave it to the elephants, camels, asses (great giants, Nephilim and Elioud). And they began to beat one another, and the whole earth shook because of them
- 88.3 And when I looked in the vision, one of these four that had come cast a line from heaven and gathered and took all the great stars, those whose genitals were like the genitals of the horses, and bound them all by their hands and their feet, and cast them into an abyss of the earth.
- 89.1 And one of the four went to the white bull (Noah), and taught him a mystery, trembling as he was. He was born as a bull, but was a man, and built for himself a great boat (the ark), and dwelt there up, and three bulls (Shem, Ham, and Japheth) went with him into that vessel, and they were hid.
- 89.2 And again I lifted up my eyes to heaven and saw a high vault with seven water channels on it (the upper waters), and those channels poured much water into a region (the earth).
- 89.3 And I looked again, and springs (fountains from the deep) opened up at the bottom of this great region (the earth), and the water began to bubble and rise above the bottom. And I looked at that area (the earth), until the whole surface was covered by water.
- 89.4 And water, darkness, and mist covered it, and I looked upon the height of that water, and that water had risen over that area, and was poured over the area, and it remained upon the earth.
- 89.5 And all the bulls in that region (the wicked generation) were gathered there, till I saw them sink and be swallowed up and destroyed in that water.
- 89.6 And the boat (the ark) floated on the water, but the bulls, elephants, camels, and donkeys (bulls, great giants, Nephilim and Elioud) sank to the bottom, along with all the animals, so that I could see them no more. And they were unable to get out, but were destroyed and sank in the depths.
- 89.7 And I looked again in that vision until the water channels (the upper waters) were removed from that high vault, and fissures were made in the earth, and other chasms (canyons) were opened.
- 89.8 And the water began to flow down into it, until the earth became visible again, and the boat (the ark) set itself upon the earth, and the darkness disappeared, and the light appeared.
- 89.9 And the white bull (Noah), which was a man, went out of that ship (the Ark), and the three bulls (Shem, Ham, and Japheth) with him. And one of the three bulls was white like the other bull, and one of them turned red like blood, and one was black (the color of the breed). And the white bull (Noah) died.
- 89.10 And they began to become the fathers of wild beasts and birds, so that there arose all kinds of them: lions, tigers, wolves, dogs, hyenas, wild boars, foxes, badgers, pigs, falcons,

- vultures, kites, eagles, and ravens (every nation of mankind). But among them was born a white bull (Abraham).
- 89.11 And they began to bite one another (fight among themselves), but the white bull (Abraham), who was born among them, became the father of a wild ass (Ishmael) and a white bull (Isaac) with it, and the wild donkeys (the Ishmaelites) increased.
- 89.12 But the bull (Isaac) that was born fathered a black wild boar (Esau) and a white sheep (Jacob), and the wild boar (Esau) fathered many swine, and that sheep (Jacob) was the father of twelve sheep (the twelve ancestors).
- 89.13 And when the twelve sheep grew up, they delivered one of them (Joseph) to the donkeys (Midianites), and they in turn gave that sheep (Joseph) to the wolves (the Egyptians), and that sheep (Joseph) grew up among the wolves (the Egyptians).
- 89.14 And the Lord brought the eleven sheep (the rest of the ancestors) to dwell there with him, and to feed among the wolves (Egyptians), and they multiplied and became a great flock of sheep (many offspring).
- 89.15 And the wolves (the Egyptians) began to be afraid of them, and they oppressed them, so that they forced them to put away their boys, and then they threw their boys into a river with much water, but those sheep (the Hebrews) began to cry out for their boys, and to complain to their Lord.
- 89.16 But a sheep (Moses), who had been rescued from the wolves (the Egyptians), fled and escaped the wild donkeys (the Ishmaelites). And I saw how the sheep (the Hebrews) groaned and howled, and prayed unto the Lord with all their might, until that Lord of the sheep (God) came down at the call of the sheep (the Hebrews), from a high place (heaven), and came to them, and looked after them.
- 89.17 And he called that sheep (Moses) that had fled from the wolves (the Egyptians), and spoke with him about the wolves (the Egyptians), that he should warn them not to let the sheep (the Hebrews) had to touch.
- 89.18 And the sheep (Moses) went to the wolves (the Egyptians), according to the Word of the Lord, and another sheep (Aaron) met that sheep and went with him. And the two went together, to the assembly of these wolves (the Egyptians), spoke to them and warned them that from then on, they would not touch those sheep (the Hebrews) anymore.
- 89.19 And after that I saw the wolves (the Egyptians), how they dealt even harder with the sheep (the Hebrews), with all their might, and how the sheep (the Hebrews) cried.
- 89.20 And their Lord came to the sheep (the Hebrews), and began to beat those wolves (the Egyptians), and the wolves (the Egyptians) began to groan, but the sheep (the Hebrews) became silent, and from that time moment they stopped calling.
- 89.21 And I looked at the sheep (the Hebrews) until they escaped from the wolves (the Egyptians), but the eyes of the wolves (the Egyptians) were blinded, and those wolves (the Egyptians) went chasing sheep (the Hebrews) with all their might.
- 89.22 And the Lord of the sheep (God) went with them, as he led them, and all his sheep (the Hebrews) followed him. And his face was glorious, and his appearance terrible and beautiful.
- 89.23 But the wolves (the Egyptians) began to chase those sheep (the Hebrews) until they met at a stretch of water (The Red Sea).
- 89.24 And that water (the Red Sea) was divided, and the water stood on one side and on the other before them. And their Lord, as he led them, stood between them and the wolves (the Egyptians).

- 89.25 And while the wolves (the Egyptians) had not yet seen the sheep (the Hebrews) when they went to the midst of that pool of water, the sheep (the Hebrews) pursued the wolves (the Egyptians), and those wolves (the Egyptians) ran after them in that cleft water (the Red Sea).
- 89.26 But when they saw the Lord of the sheep (God), they turned to flee from him, but that water (the Red Sea) flowed back together, and suddenly took its natural shape again, and the water swelled up, and went up until it covered these wolves (the Egyptians).
- 89.27 And I watched as all the wolves (the Egyptians) who had chased the sheep (the Hebrews) were destroyed and drowned.
- 89.28 But the sheep (the Hebrews) escaped from that water, and went into a desert where there was no water, nor grass. And they began to open their eyes and see, and I saw that the Lord of the sheep (God) feed them, and gave them water and grass, and the sheep went, and He led them.
- 89.29 And that sheep (Moses) went to the top of a high rock (Mount Sinai), and the Lord of the sheep (God) sent something to them.
- 89.30 And after that I saw the Lord of the sheep (God) standing before them, and his appearing was terrible and majestic, and all those sheep (the Hebrews) saw him and were afraid of him.
- 89.31 And they were all afraid and trembled before Him, and they cried out to the sheep (Moses) who was in their midst: "We cannot stand before our Lord, nor look at him." 89.32 Then went that sheep (Moses) that led them, again to the top of the rock (Sinai), and the sheep (the Hebrews) began to be blinded, and wander from the path that was shown, but that sheep (Moses) knew it not.
- 89.33 And the Lord of the sheep (God) was very angry with them, and that sheep (Moses) knew it, and went down from the top of the rock (Sinai), and came to the sheep (the Hebrews), and found the majority of them with their eyes blinded, and went astray from his path.
- 89.34 And when they saw it, they were afraid and trembled before him, and wished that they could return to their tents. And that sheep (Moses), took some other sheep (Hebrews) with him and went to the sheep (Hebrews) that had gone astray, and then began to kill them, and the sheep (Hebrews) were afraid of it. And that sheep (Moses) brought those sheep (the Hebrews) that were lost, and they returned to their tents.
- 89.36 And I looked at it in the vision, until the sheep (Moses) became a man, and built a house (the Tabernacle) for the Lord of the sheep, and made all the sheep stand in that house.
- 89.37 And I looked until the sheep (Aaron), which he had met, that other sheep (Moses), who led the sheep (the Hebrews), fell asleep (died). And I watched until all the big sheep were destroyed and the little ones came in their place, until they came to a meadow, and went near a river of water (the Jordan).
- 89.38 And the sheep that led them (Moses) grew into a man, and was separated from them, and fell asleep, and all the sheep (the Hebrews) sought, and wept bitterly over him.
- 89.39 And I looked until they ceased howling before the sheep (Moses) and crossed the river from the water (the Jordan). And there were all the sheep that led them (the judges of Israel), instead of the one that was asleep fallen (deceased), and they led them.

89.40 And I looked until the sheep came to a good place, a pleasant and beautiful land (Canaan), and I looked until the sheep (the Hebrews) were satisfied. And that house (Tabernacle) was in the midst of them in that green and pleasant land.

89.41 And sometimes their eyes were opened, and sometimes blinded, until another sheep (Samuel) arose and led them, and brought them all back. And their eyes were opened. 89.42 And the dogs, and the foxes, and the wild boars began to devour those sheep (the Hebrews), until the Lord of the sheep (God) raised up a ram (King Saul) from among them, to lead them.

89.43 And that ram (King Saul) began to beat the dogs (Philistines), the foxes (Edom), and the wild boars (Esau), on one side and on the other, until he had destroyed them all. 89.44 And the eyes of the sheep (Samuel) were opened, and he saw the ram (King Saul) in the midst of the sheep (the Hebrews), how he had renounced his glory, and began to kill those sheep (the Hebrews). beat them, and how he trampled them and misbehaved. 89.45 And the Lord of the sheep (God) sent the sheep (the Hebrews) to another sheep (David) and he raised it up to a ram (King) to lead the sheep (the Hebrews) instead of the sheep (Saul) Which has renounced its glory.

89.46 And he went to him, and spoke with him alone, and raised that ram (King David), and made it prince and chief of the sheep (the Hebrews). And during all this, those dogs (Philistines) oppressed the sheep.

89.47 And the first ram (Saul) pursued the second ram (David), and this second ram (David) arose and fled before him. And I watched until those dogs (Philistines) attacked the first ram (Saul).

89.48 And that second ram (David) arose and led the little sheep (the Hebrews), and that ram (David) begot many sheep, and fell asleep (deceased). And a little sheep (Solomon) became a ram (king) instead of him, and became the prince and leader of the sheep (the Hebrews).

89.49 And those sheep (Hebrews) grew and multiplied, and all the dogs (Philistines), and foxes and wild boars, were afraid and fled from them. And that ram (Solomon) slaughtered and killed all the beasts, so that it animals did not again prevail over the sheep (the Hebrews), and could not seize anything further from them.

89.50 And that house became great and broad, and for the sheep (the Hebrews) a high tower (temple) was built on that house for the Lord of the sheep (God). And that house was low, but the tower (temple) rose up and was high. And the Lord of the sheep (God) stood on that tower (temple) and they set a full table for him.

89.51 And I saw how those sheep (the Hebrews) went astray again, and walked in many ways, and left that house of theirs, and the Lord of the sheep (God) called some of the sheep (the prophets), and sent them to the sheep (the Hebrews), but the sheep (the Hebrews) began to kill them.

89.52 But one of them (Elijah) was saved, and was not killed, and he sprang away and cried out to the sheep (the Hebrews). And they wanted to kill him, but the Lord of the sheep (God) delivered him from the hands of the sheep (the Hebrews), brought him to me, and made him dwell there. 89.53 And he sent many other sheep (prophets) to those sheep (Hebrews), to testify against them and to complain about them.

89.54 And after this I saw how when they left the house of the Lord of the sheep (God), and his tower (temple), and went astray in everything, and their eyes were blinded. And I saw how the Lord of the sheep (God) slaughtered many of them in their pasture, until these sheep (the Hebrews) invited the butchers and betrayed his place.

89.55 And he delivered them into the hands of the lions and the tigers, and the wolves and the hyenas, and into the hands of the foxes, and all the beasts (nations). And those wild beasts started those sheep (the Hebrews) in to tear pieces.

89.56 And I saw how he left their house, and their tower (the temple), and delivered them all into the hands of the lions (Assyrians), that they might tear them to pieces and devour them, and put them in the hands of the lions (Assyrians). giving of all animals (nations).
89.57 And I began to cry with all my might, and cried to the Lord of the sheep (God) and the sheep (the Hebrews) represent them before Him, lest all the wild beasts devour them.
89:58 But he stood still, though he saw it, and rejoiced that they were devoured, swallowed, and carried away. And he gave them into the hands of all the animals as food.
89.59 And he called seventy shepherds (leaders), and compelled them to the sheep, that they might tend them. And he said to the shepherds and their companions, "Each one of you, from now on, shall keep the sheep (the Hebrews) guard and do what I command you.
89.60 And I will deliver them to you, exactly counted, and I will tell you which of them will be destroyed, and destroy them." And he delivered those sheep (the Hebrews) over to them.
89.61 And he called another, and said unto him: "Observe and see all that these shepherds do against these sheep (the Hebrews), for they will destroy more of them than I have commanded them.

89.62 And write down all the superfluous destruction done by the shepherds, how much they destroy at my command and how much they destroy of their own accord. Write to each shepherd, individually, everything he destroys.

89.63 And read before me exactly how many they destroy of their own accord and how many are handed over for destruction, so that this may be the evidence for me, against them. So that I know all the deeds of the shepherds to hand them over for judgment. And I will see what they do, whether they keep my command with which I have commanded them, or not.

89.64 But they must not know it, and you must not show this to them, but only write it against each individual in his time, all that the shepherds destroy, and bring it all to me." 89.65 And I looked until these shepherds shepherded them in their season, and they began to kill them, and more than they were commanded to destroy, and they gave those sheep (the Hebrews) into the hands of the lions (the Assyrians).

89.66 And the lions and the tigers devoured and swallowed up the majority of the sheep (the Hebrews), and the wild boars ate with them, and they set fire to the tower (temple) and demolished that house.

89.67 And I was very sad about that tower (temple), because that house of the sheep was demolished, and after that, I was not able to see if these sheep went into that house. 89.68 And the shepherds and their attendants gave those sheep (the Hebrews) over to all the animals (nations), that they might devour them. Each of them in due time received an exact number, and for each of them, the one after another, it was written in a scroll how many of them were destroyed.

89.69 And over every dead person, more than was prescribed to be destroyed, I began to weep and lament very much, because of these sheep (Hebrews).

89.70 And I also saw in the vision how a man wrote every day, how he wrote down every one who was destroyed by those shepherds. And he brought this and presented the whole scroll to the Lord of the sheep, all that they had done and all that each of them had made disappear, and all that they had done to destroy.

- 89.71 And the scroll was read before the Lord of the sheep, and he took the scroll in his hand, read, and sealed it, and laid it down.
- 89.72 And after that I saw the shepherds tending for twelve hours, and three of those sheep (Ezra, Haggai, Zechariah) returned (remnant after the exile), they came and began to build up all that had fallen down from that house, but the wild boars (Samaritans) hindered them so that they could go no further.
- 89.73 And they began to build again, as before, and when they erected the tower, and it was called the high tower (the second temple). And they set a table in the tower (the second temple), but all the bread on it was unclean and not clean.
- 89.74 And besides all this, the eyes of these sheep were blinded, so that they could not see, and neither did their shepherds. And more of them were handed over for destruction, and they trampled the sheep (the Hebrews) with their feet and devoured them.
- 89.75 But the Lord of the sheep (God) still remained there until all the sheep were scattered, and He had mixed them up and they could not deliver themselves from the hands of the beasts (nations).
- 89.76 And the one who wrote in the scroll brought it up, showed it, and read it before the Lord of the sheep. And he besought him on their behalf, and one tempted him when he did all the deeds to him showed of their shepherds and testified before him against all the shepherds.
- 89.77 And he took the scroll, and set it before Him, and went out.
- 90.1 And I looked till the time when thirty-five shepherds had herded the sheep in the same way, each one separately, they all finished their time as the first. And others received them in their hands to to tend them in their time, each shepherd in his own time.
- 90.2 And after that I saw in the vision, all the birds of heaven coming: the eagles, the vultures, and the kites, and the ravens (Syrians). But the eagles (Romans) led all the birds, and she began to eat the sheep, peck out their eyes, and devour their flesh.
- 90.3 And the sheep (the Hebrews) cried out, because the birds ate their flesh. And I cried out and lamented in my sleep because of that shepherd that was tending the sheep (the Hebrews).
- 90.4 And I looked until the sheep (the Hebrews) were devoured by those dogs, and by the eagles (Romans), and by the kites, and they left them neither flesh, nor skin, nor sinew, until only their bones were left. And their bones fell to the ground and the sheep (Hebrews) became few in number.
- 90.5 And I looked till the time when twenty-three shepherds had herded, and they completed it, each in his own time, fifty-eight times.
- 90.6 And little lambs were born of those white sheep, and they began to open their eyes to see, and to howl for the sheep (the Hebrews).
- 90.7 But the sheep (the Hebrews) wept not over them, and did not listen to what they said to them, but were very deaf, and their eyes were exceedingly and excessively blinded.
- 90.8 And I saw in the vision how the ravens fell upon those lambs, and they took one of those lambs (John the Baptist), and rent the sheep to pieces and devoured it.
- 90.9 And I looked until horns came upon those lambs, but the ravens beat down their horns. And I looked until a great horn (the Messiah) grew upon one of these sheep (the Hebrews), and their eyes were opened.

- 90.10 And he looked at them, and their eyes were opened. And he cried to the sheep (the Hebrews), and the rams saw it, and they all ran to Him.
- 90.11 And besides all this, those eagles (the Romans), vultures, ravens, and the kites, still tore the sheep (the Hebrews) to pieces, and flew upon them and devoured them. And the sheep (the Hebrews) were silent, but the rams lamented and howled.
- 90.12 And those ravens fought and fought with him (the Messiah), and wanted to wipe out his horn, but they could not overpower her.
- 90.13 And I looked upon them until the shepherds and the eagles (Romans), and those vultures, and the kites, came and cried unto the ravens that they might smash the horn of that ram (the Messiah) in pieces. And they fought and fought with him, and fought with them and cried out, that help might come to him.
- 90.14 And I looked at that man, who wrote down the names of the shepherds, and brought them before the Lord of the sheep (God), and came, and he helped the Ram (the Messiah) and showed it all; his help came down.
- 90:15 And I looked until the Lord of the sheep (God) came to them in anger, all who saw him fled, and they all fell in darkness before Him.
- 90.16 He gathered together all the eagles (Romans) and vultures and ravens and kites, and brought with them all the wild sheep, and they all gathered together and helped one another to lift the horn of the Ram (the Messiah) to break into pieces.
- 90.17 And I looked at the man who wrote the scroll at the command of the Lord, until he opened the scroll of destruction which the last twelve shepherds had made (the Christian era ????). And he showed before the Lord of the sheep (God) that they had destroyed even more than those before them.
- 90.18 And I looked until the Lord of the sheep (God) came to them and took his rod of wrath and struck the earth (the return of the Messiah). And the earth was divided. And all the beasts, and the birds of the sky fled from those sheep, and sank into the earth, and it closed itself upon them.
- 90.19 And I looked until a great sword was given to the sheep (the Hebrews). And the sheep (the Hebrews) went out against all the wild beasts to kill them. And all the beasts and birds of the sky fled before them.
- 90.20 And I looked until a throne was set up in the pleasant land, and the Lord of the sheep (God) sat on it. And they took all the sealed scrolls and opened the scrolls before the Lord of the sheep (God).
- 90.21 And the Lord called the men, the first seven white, and commanded them to bring before Him the first star (Azazel), which went before the stars, whose private parts were as of horses, and brought them all before the face of Him.
- 90.22 And He said to the man who wrote before Him, who was one of the seven whites. He said to him, "Take the seventy shepherds to whom I delivered the sheep, and who, by their own authority, killed more than I commanded them."
- 90.23 And I saw them all bound, and they all stood before Him.
- 90.24 And judgment was given first to the stars (the Watchers), and they were judged and found guilty, and they went to the place of damnation, and were cast into a deep place full of fire and full of pillars of fire.

90.25 And those seventy shepherds were judged and found guilty, and they also were cast into that abyss of fire.

90.26 And I saw at that time how a similar abyss was opened in the midst of the earth, which was full of fire, and they brought the blind sheep, and they were all condemned and found guilty, and cast into that abyss of fire and they burned. And that abyss was to the south of that house.

90.27 And I saw those sheep burn and burn their bones.

90.28 And I arose to look, until He had folded that old house (the earth), and removed all the pillars, and all the beams and ornaments of that house (the earth) were folded with it. And they removed it and put it in a place in the south.

90.29 And I looked until the Lord of the sheep (God) brought a new house, greater and higher than the first, and he put it in the place of the first that was folded. And all its pillars were new, and the ornaments were new and larger than those of the first, the old one that had been removed. And the Lord of the sheep (God) was in the midst of it.

90.30 And I saw all the sheep that were left behind, and all the beasts of the earth, and all the birds of the heavens that fell down and worship those sheep, and in every command they entreated and obeyed them.

90.31 And after this these three were clothed in white, and they held me by my hand, those who had brought me first. She, with the hand of that ram (The Messiah) also held me, took me up, and laid me in the midst of those sheep before the sentence was pronounced.

90.32 And those sheep were all white, and their wool thick and pure.

90.33 And all those who were desolate and scattered, and all the wild beasts, and all the fowls of the heavens gathered together in that house, and the Lord of the sheep (God) rejoiced greatly, for they were all good, and had returned to his house.

90.34 And I looked until they had laid down that sword which was given to the sheep, and they brought it back into his house, and it was sealed before the Lord. And all the sheep became locked up in that house, but it couldn't contain them.

90.35 And the eyes of all of them were opened, and they saw good, and there was not one among them that could not see.

90.36 And I saw that the house was large, wide, and exceedingly full.

90.37 And I saw how a white bull was born, and its horns were great, and all the wild beasts and all the birds of the sky were afraid of it, and begged it continually.

90.38 And I looked until all their kinds were changed and they all became white bulls. And the first among them was a wild ox. And that wild ox the sheep (God) rejoiced over them, and over all the bulls.

90.39 And I was sleeping in the midst of them and I woke up and saw everything.

90.40 And this is the vision which I saw while I slept, and when I awoke, I blessed the Lord of righteousness, and gave glory to Him.

90.41 But after this I wept bitterly and my tears did not stop until I could bear no more. When I looked, they flowed because of what I saw, for all will come to pass and be fulfilled, and all deeds of the people, in the order, as was shown to me.

90.42 That night I remembered my first dream, and just because of that I cried, and was disturbed, because I had seen this vision.
